IS AN ICAIA CONFERENCE THE PLACE FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OR WHAT?

Wow, we are about to embark on our 50th conference. This is possible only because of so many dedicated automotive instructors who found that getting together at least twice each year is essential for professional development. This allows us to bring state-of -the-art automotive technology to our students consistently.

How in the world did it begin, some may ask. Well, in my humble opinion, back in 1976 it was bound to happen. It was a time when we had our first oil crisis and the public was demanding that someone stop the increase in air pollution. The auto manufacturers were forced to use space age technology to do battle on those two fronts. The auto manufacturers found that the increased use of electronics was the only way to win those battles, but also understood that it would take more than the run-of-the-mill automotive technician to repair and maintain those very sophisticated machines.

Back in about 1975 many of the community college automotive instructors received letters from the Illinois EPA requesting our presence at a hotel near Midway Airport in Chicago to inform us of the need to change attitudes on the part of present day automotive technicians, as well as future technicians. It was there that I met Jim Lausted of Prairie State College and Paul Rickert of Waubonsee Community College. We were quite excited about the changes that were taking place in automotive technology and wondered what we, as automotive instructors, would have to do to meet the demands that were about to be taking place. Perhaps a month after that meeting, all three of us met again at a new products meeting given by Fred Pierson at the Chrysler Training Center. If I have my facts straight, it was there during a coffee break that we discussed the need for us automotive instructors to meet on a regular basis.

We (us three) then set up a time to meet at Prairie State College to discuss the formation of

an organization. We felt that this was needed in order to get the attention of all the automotive manufacturers, as well as the after-market companies, to put on training sessions specifically for us automotive technology instructors. We simply spread the word and had our first official conference at Waubonsee Community College, the 2^{nd} one at Prairie State College, and the 3^{rd} at Triton College. By the time we had our 3^{rd} conference, we had a good solid ICAIA Board in place, and we were on a roll. When starting the organization, we knew that organizations needed to have officers such as a president, secretary, and a treasurer to handle the money; and since no one volunteered to be the president we were quite informal. I guess we just saw ourselves as facilitators at those first 3 conferences rather than association officers. Paul hosted the first conference and served as a master of ceremonies there and Jim and I did likewise at our schools. However, as the association continued to grow, the ICAIA Board appointed the founders. As hysterical historians we had to nail down who the first presidents were. So, we hysterical guys just figured that since Waubonsee hosted the first conference, Paul Rickert must have been the first president. Jim Lausted was the second, and I became the third official president.

Marty Zvonar attended our second conference at Prairie State College and soon after became our Executive Secretary/Treasurer and maintained that position until his retirement from Parkland College. He was very hard nosed (if you will pardon the expression) and kept all of the Board Members on their toes and was perhaps most responsible for our earlier successes. He has mellowed a lot since he was able to put in more time on the links and now cruises with his lovely wife in their new motor home. He now serves as one of the four hysterical historians (after all, he's the one that nailed that title on us).

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IS AN ICAIA CONFERENCE THE PLACE FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OR WHAT?

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As time went on, our main concern was finding sites on which to hold our conferences. We appreciated the fact that our administrators allowed us to host the conferences more than once, but we do not want to abuse the privilege. I must say that finding a host school continues to be a concern at each Board Meeting. Some schools have hosted as many as 4 times. At earlier conferences, the host school had to foot most of the expenses, but that is no longer necessary. The ICAIA membership numbers have increased over the years and thanks to the ICAIA officers, I am proud to say, we are on firm ground.

Back to the first question; "Why are we still in existence?". First, and foremost, it is because our members are the cream of the crop. They are the ones that sincerely care about their students being successful as entry level technicians. Secondly, yes, we owe a lot to the various manufacturers for their support, as well as, school administrations. However, in my humble opinion, once again we continue to exist today mainly due to those members who have served as hosts and provided a place for us to meet year after year; and the dedication of the many members that took a turn as an ICAIA Board Member or as an Officer. Our hats are off to those people and we plan to recognize them all at our 50th Conference in October, 2000.
