Southern Illinois University Carbondale Automotive Technology Program Opens in Chicago!

Students are now able to obtain a bachelor's degree in Automotive Technology through a Southern Illinois University Carbondale (SIUC) off-campus program being offered at Harry S. Truman College in Chicago. The off-campus offering is a "2+2 program", in which students first complete an associate of applied science degree in automotive technology and then transfer into SIUC's Automotive Technology program. In the program, SIUC and adjunct faculty teach three semesters of upper-level automotive technical and automotive business/management courses on weekends at Truman College. In addition to the three semesters of courses offered through SIUC, students will also need one semester of university-core courses to be completed at a Chicago-area university to complete the bachelor's degree.

The program is intended for and limited to graduates of the City Colleges of Chicago, residents of Chicago, and to place-bound students.
